

Improving Literacy in Adults with Developmental Disabilities

There are over 50,000 adults with developmental disabilities (DD) in Ohio, most of whom face considerable literacy challenges, limiting their opportunities in life.

ElevateDD, the organization behind Adult Literacy Ohio, is investing substantially to develop a learning model to help adults with DD enhance their literacy skills. Adult Literacy Ohio aims to boost confidence, improve community navigation, enhance quality of life, and support workforce development for people with DD. Our goal is to **serve over 1,000 learners annually within three years**, significantly improving literacy skills within the community.

To gather direct feedback from adults with DD, ElevateDD collaborated with OCALI on a statewide survey to understand literacy-related needs. The survey, which received responses from 669 people across 77 Ohio counties, provides valuable insights into the need for literacy skill development and the factors driving this need. Notably, 94% of the adults with DD who responded expressed a desire to learn to read or improve their reading skills.

Is the Adult Literacy Ohio Learning Model Effective?

A report by Dr. Chris Lemons, an Associate Professor of Special Education in the Graduate School of Education at Stanford University, validated the efficacy of sustained literacy support. He found that 100% of learners who engaged in more than one 16-week session through Adult Literacy Ohio made "notable progress." That means that **every single adult** who participated in the program for more than one session has improved literacy. The strongest gains are in phonological awareness, phonics, & word reading.

Why is Literacy Important?

Improved Independence

People with higher literacy skills are less likely to rely on others to navigate daily life tasks like reading a bus schedule, understanding instructions for medications, and shopping at the local grocery store.

Access to Employment

Literacy skills are often necessary to meet the basic requirements of many jobs, such as reading instructions or safety information, filling out forms or applications, and communicating effectively with colleagues, customers, and supervisors.

Improved Quality of Life

Building literacy skills promotes a person's growth by increasing access to information, enhancing their ability to communicate effectively with others, and enabling them to better understand and navigate the world around them.

Top 3 reasons respondents wanted to improve their reading skills:

48% To get a job, to get a better job, or to do my job better

To use text, Facebook or Instagram, to talk with my friends

To be more independent at home in cooking, taking medications, and other activities
